They look after the college affairs according to their responsibilities.

The IQAC planned certain best practices in the college in co-ordination with various committees in general and college developmental committee in particular. Different departments which did not have separate staff rooms for their departments were provided with staff rooms. For example, the Departments of Mathematics, Punjabi, and Economics were provided with staff rooms. The Departments were also equipped with projectors, computer and internet facility. Target- oriented works were undertaken and completed by the end of the year. New toilets for the common staff room as well as students were constructed. Coaching for the IELTS was started in collaboration with "Babuji Hari Singh Basi Entrepreneurship Centre" in the college on the demand of students and general community.

- 8. Three national level conferences, one each by the Department of Punjabi in collaboration with the Punjabi Sahit Academy, Ludhiana, the Department of Physics and the Department of Political Science, will be organized during 2016-17.
- 9. Annual Prize Distribution function will be organised for meritorious and outstanding students.
- 10. Annual convocation will also be organised to award of degrees to the students.
- 11. Swacch Bharat Abhiyan will be introduced at college level.
- 12. The Honesty Shop is going to be installed at girls hostel for provide stationery and other articles of daily need.

The College has its NSS unit which provides opportunities to the youth to understand the current problems of the society. In case of teachers, they attend Refresher courses/Orientation courses/Winter/Summer schools to update their knowledge. They also participate in seminars/conferences and present/publish their research papers. The Women Grievance Redressal Cell aims at making every effort to prevent sexual harassment and ensure that the female students and employees of the institution enjoy maximum safety, security and 'feel at home' atmosphere in the college.
